We fund vital improvements to facilities, pioneering research, and innovative projects that enhance the experience of patients, families, and staff. Working closely with St George's University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, City St George's, University of London, and our local community, we're committed to building a healthier tomorrow for everyone we serve.

# MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO

**It's an absolute privilege to have recently joined St George's Hospital Charity and to already have witnessed the incredible impact of our work.**

As we look back on 2023/24, it's clear that this has been a year of growth and real progress for our Charity. We've faced challenges, but thanks to our incredible supporters, dedicated staff, and strong partnerships, we've achieved so much together.

We've raised an impressive £2.55m, which has enabled us to fund over 180 diverse projects that have made a meaningful difference for patients, families, and staff across St George's and Queen Mary's hospitals.

In fact, 70% of staff surveyed agree that the charity has improved the non-clinical experience for patients and visitors, with 54% observing improved clinical outcomes.

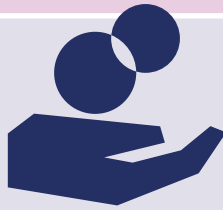

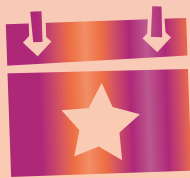

# HELPING THE TRUST TREAT MORE PEOPLE FASTER

With the NHS under increasing pressure, it is more important than ever that we support the hospitals so more people can get the treatment they need faster. Our targeted funding can make a huge difference to staff and patients. From purchasing new machinery to creating new spaces in the hospital, here are some of the projects we are particularly proud of from 2023/24.

## MAKING FITNESS AND REHAB ACCESSIBLE FOR ALL AT QUEEN MARY'S HOSPITAL

This year, we funded a £1,050 Ski Ergometer for the Douglas Bader Gym at Queen Mary's, giving its 1,422 members, including wheelchair users and those with mobility difficulties, more accessible exercise options. We also provided two Sara Plus Standing Hoists (£12,088) to support patient rehabilitation and mobility. The hoists help physiotherapists get patients standing sooner, aiding recovery and muscle strengthening while reducing injury risks for staff who support them. Together, these new additions improve fitness access, support patient well-being, and enhance safety for both patients and staff.

## ST GEORGE'S TEAM HELPING FASTER DIAGNOSIS WORLDWIDE

Corticobasal Syndrome (CBS) is a neurodegenerative condition that can affect movement, behaviour, or language. In 2020, Professor Garrard and his team at St George's Neuroscience Research Centre developed the Mini Linguistic State Examination (MLSE) to detect subtle language changes, crucial for diagnosing CBS. Originally developed for English speakers, the test rapidly spawned adaptation for a wide range of other languages. £21,525 from the Charity funded a global conference, bringing together scientists from across the world to discuss the challenges of adapting the MLSE for other language communities. This international effort aims to speed up CBS diagnosis worldwide, helping patients get faster, more accurate treatment.

## PLAY TEAM HELP TREAT CHILDREN QUICKER

We funded £3,440 for new play materials to support St George's amazing A&E and general play teams. From sensory toys to art supplies, these resources help children feel calmer and more at ease, making treatment quicker and less stressful for everyone. By keeping young patients engaged, they're helping families through long waits and engaging children in their rehabilitation goals. Every year, these materials bring comfort and care to around 9,400 patients and 18,000 visitors.

## OFFICE REFURBISHMENT IMPROVES COMFORT AND EFFICIENCY

Thanks to £10,320 from the Charity, the Cancer Clinical Nurse Specialists' office has undergone a much-needed makeover. The upgrade offers more space and proper workstations, making the team more comfortable and efficient. It's also allowed them to introduce new nurse-led phone clinics, making it easier for patients to access specialist care remotely.

## SUPPORTING THE TRUST TO DELIVER BETTER MEDICAL OUTCOMES

From funding groundbreaking research to training and development, a key focus of our activity is to empower staff with the support and tools they need to improve medical outcomes for patients. The following stories illustrate some of the ways our funding has had a positive impact this year.

# INVESTING IN OUR NHS STAFF

We believe dedicated, skilled staff are the NHS's biggest asset. In 2023/24 we funded 42 grants that invested in staff development through training or attendance at conferences.

By asking staff to complete a survey in the weeks and months after they had completed their training or conference, we have been able to assess the impact on staff morale as well as patient outcomes.

## IMPROVING PRESSURE ULCER DIAGNOSES FOR ALL SKIN TONES

We awarded £950 to send two Clinical Nurse Specialists (CNS) to the European Pressure Ulcer Advisory Panel. The conference addressed the challenges of diagnosing pressure ulcers in patients with darker skin tones, providing the CNSs with valuable skills to improve early detection. They have since shared this knowledge with hundreds of colleagues, helping improve treatment across the hospital.

## INNOVATIVE ROBOTIC DEVICES TRANSFORMING REHABILITATION

We're thrilled to have awarded £146,150 to bring two innovative robotic devices, Amadeo and Diego, to the Wolfson neurorehabilitation unit at Queen Mary's Hospital. These advanced robots help patients regain arm movement by enabling many more repetitions than traditional therapy, a crucial part of recovery. They even help detect tiny, early movements that are hard to see, giving patients a much-needed boost in motivation. Very few NHS hospitals have such advanced equipment and we are proud to be leading the way in innovative care, with around 40 patients a year benefiting from the devices. The robots not only expand what's possible in rehab but also make therapy sessions more efficient, helping them do more with the same dedicated team.



## PAVING THE WAY IN VACCINE IMMUNITY RESEARCH

The Charity awarded £20,000 to Professor Julian Ma and his research team for a study that focused on understanding immune responses to the COVID-19 vaccine in patients with pre-existing illnesses which may affect their immune systems. The early results are promising and have already paved the way for new research, including a follow-up study focusing on patients with Tuberous Sclerosis Complex, a rare genetic disorder.

## RELIEVING PAIN FOR PATIENTS

Medical equipment doesn't have to be expensive to make a big impact. We funded £197 for seven new TENS machines for the Inpatient Pain Service. These devices help patients manage chronic pain independently. Unlike pain medications, TENS can be used long-term, giving patients greater control over their pain relief.

# FREE WI-FI KEEPS PATIENTS CONNECTED

In November, we concluded a 12-month £49,853 project to provide complimentary Wi-Fi at St George's Hospital. A charity survey showed that the Wi-Fi kept patients connected with loved ones, helped alleviate boredom, and improved overall wellbeing.

# NEW DIALYSIS CENTRE IMPROVES PATIENT CARE AND COMFORT

In September, we celebrated the opening of the Courtyard Dialysis Centre, a modern facility replacing a temporary trailer used for six years. Thanks to £86,796 from the Charity, the centre now features four new acute dialysis spaces. The additional stations allow outpatient dialysis for patients with higher mobility needs, reducing the need for patients to be seen on the wards.

# A BREW WITH BENEFITS FOR NEUROREHABILITATION PATIENTS

The Coffee Club, funded by £720 from the Charity, takes neurorehabilitation patients to on-site cafes to buy a coffee and chat to others outside the ward. This offers a chance to practice everyday tasks in a natural setting, while allowing therapists to observe and enhance rehabilitation programmes.



# A ROYAL VIEWING: BEDSIDE TVS DURING CORONATION WEEKEND

We awarded £1,506 to provide free access to bedside TVs at St George's Hospital during King Charles III's coronation weekend, giving patients a front-row seat to the celebrations and making their stay a bit more memorable and enjoyable!

# ST GEORGE'S GOES GREEN!

Known for its beautiful green spaces, St George's Hospital expanded its Green Plan this year with support from a £332 grant. The funding went towards birdhouses, insect hotels, and a butterfly tower, with the aim to create new habitats and boost biodiversity on the hospital grounds. We're excited to share that a group of goldfinches has already made their home near the Education Centre! A welcome touch of nature that's been a hit with patients, staff, and visitors.



# ENHANCING HOSPITAL EXPERIENCE THROUGH ART

We're incredibly proud of our Arts St George's team, who manage our arts programme and deliver a wide range of activities, live events, and creative projects to make hospital spaces more welcoming.

Here are just some of the ways they helped make a positive impact on patients and visitors in 2023/24.

## ARTISTS IN RESIDENCE

Our Resident Artist Programme has reached over 3,000 people this year. Patients, from the hospital classroom to those in intensive care, have benefitted from visual arts, storytelling and music. In June 2023, we celebrated our first cohort of artists—Josh Bilton, Jelly Cleaver, and Emily Stapleton Jefferis—through a showcase as part of Wandsworth Arts Fringe. In October, we welcomed new artists, songwriter Heather McClelland and visual artist Phoebe Kaniewska.



## ARTS WEEK 2023

St George's Arts Week is an annual celebration of arts and culture across the Trust. Over four days, we showcased live performances, visual arts workshops, and displays at St George's and Queen Mary's sites. Our 2023 theme, 'Share Your Story', was chosen to reflect the numerous powerful and heartfelt tales heard across the hospital day in day out.

## TRANSFORMING SPACES FOR GRIEVING FAMILIES

Arts St George's continued to work closely with the Trust on improving our hospital environment this year, particularly in designing sensitive spaces for grieving families. The new Maternity Bereavement Suite at St George's Hospital, aims to provide families with a comfortable and respectful space during an incredibly difficult time. The family of a baby who passed away raised over £80,000 to fund this work. Additionally, a grant from the Charity has transformed the Mortuary's waiting room, creating a calming environment with new decor, furniture, and artwork.





## ENSURING STAFF FEEL HAPPY, VALUED AND SUPPORTED

Providing outstanding care requires staff to feel supported, so we continue to allocate considerable resources to promoting the satisfaction and wellbeing of our Trust's staff. We've picked out a few stories to give a taste of the kind of grants we award to keep staff content, healthy and safe.

## STAFF SERVE UP FUN WITH BADMINTON SESSIONS

We funded £2,823 for nine months of badminton sessions for ICU staff, promoting health, wellbeing, and team bonding. Feedback was overwhelmingly positive, and due to its success, we have granted an additional £3,475 to extend the sessions for another year!

## LAUGHTER THERAPY BOOSTS WELLBEING FOR STAFF

We funded a £250 “Laughter Lab” session for Neurosciences Physiotherapy staff, using laughter to boost wellbeing, manage stress, and prevent burnout. The team loved it and are now planning to bring this laughter therapy to patients on the stroke unit.

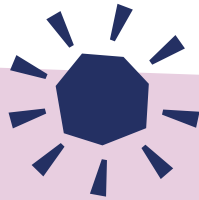

## NEW CLOAKROOMS FOR EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT STAFF

We invested £10,811 to refurbish the male and female cloakrooms for our Emergency Department staff. With new wardrobe rails, shelves, and shoe benches, the updated space gives 350 hardworking team members a safe, secure place to change and store their belongings.



# ART MAKES A DIFFERENCE TO OUR STAFF

## STAFF CHOIR SHINE AT NATIONAL NHS CELEBRATION

Led by Choir Leader Georgia Duncan, our St George's Staff Choir celebrated the NHS 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary by writing 'Who Cares For The Carers' as part of the Our National Health Stories project. After debuting the song at the hospital's celebrations, they were honoured to perform at the national event in Manchester alongside 18 other NHS Trusts.

## A SPACE FOR REFLECTION: NEW PAVILION COMMEMORATES COVID-19 IMPACT ON STAFF

Award-winning design practice Wayward worked closely with staff to create a new arts commission reflecting the impact of COVID-19 on St George's Hospital staff. The final piece, a serene outdoor pavilion, offers a space for rest, reflection, and connection, and will be officially opened Summer 2024.



## ENCOURAGING PEOPLE TO ACCESS PRIMARY HEALTHCARE IN THE COMMUNITY

We're committed to funding community projects that help reduce hospital admissions. This year, we supported five ongoing initiatives focused on improving the physical and mental health of vulnerable local populations.

### IMPROVING CERVICAL HEALTH AWARENESS IN SOUTH LONDON'S DIVERSE COMMUNITIES

In May 2023, we awarded £28,961 to improve cervical health literacy among Muslim and minority ethnic communities in South London, who are less likely to attend screenings. The project is working with community leaders to co-design effective health literacy materials, train local community health champions and measure impact.

# SINGING WELLBEING FOR CARDIAC AND RESPIRATORY PATIENTS

We were proud to award £3,120 to support the Hearts and Lungs Song Group for a year, helping cardiac and respiratory patients experience the incredible wellbeing benefits of singing. This community group is all about improving health through the power of music!

# EMPOWERING CARERS OF YOUNG ONSET DEMENTIA PATIENTS

We're proud to have spent £5,796 this year supporting a vital group for those with Young Onset Dementia and their carers. Through remote and in-person sessions, carers feel more empowered to manage situations at home, leading to fewer GP visits.

# LOOKING FORWARD

One million patients were treated by the Trust in 2023/24, and the demand on healthcare keeps growing. The Charity's new 2024-29 strategy, Healthier Together, sets out a bold vision to build a healthier future for our communities. We aim to raise £5 million a year by 2030 to advance research and innovation, work with patients and staff to

drive solutions on the ground, ensure health equity and build links with the many communities which need our support.

None of this is possible without the incredible support of our fundraisers and donors. To show you our direction of travel we have picked out a few projects already underway. We look forward to reporting on their impact next year.



## DRIVING SOLUTIONS ON THE GROUND

We provide grants that empower the incredible staff at St George's Hospital and Queen Mary's Hospital to identify needs and create real solutions on the ground.

- In early 2024, we funded communication equipment to enhance hospital bed management, reducing the time to turnaround a vacant bed by 20 times and cutting patient wait times for a bed by 10 times.
- Clinicians on Kent Ward reached out for support to refurbish their office space, creating room for more staff to be on the ward at once. This upgrade will improve response times during incidents and free up space for a dedicated visiting room.



## ADVANCING RESEARCH AND INNOVATION

We fund research and innovation that is vital to the future of the NHS. Working with partners, we're turning new ideas into impactful healthcare solutions that will benefit the patients of the future, both at St George's and beyond.

- We're proud to support the Advanced Ventricular Arrhythmia Training and Research (AVATAR) programme, a world-leading initiative focused on improving the management of ventricular arrhythmia (VA), a potentially life-threatening heart rhythm disorder. Led by Dr Magdi Saba, the project aims to share treatment expertise with senior trainees through a 12-month fellowship. The research arm of AVATAR funds MD/PhD students focused on how technology can be applied to discover new forms of diagnosis and treatment. The flagship project to date is the first use of personalised digital twin technology. This is an area of intense research and St. George's is at the forefront. Fellows from the programme have gone on to consultant positions in Aberdeen, London, Eastbourne and Barcelona. They are now establishing their own programmes in their regions, taking our expertise and research findings nationally and internationally.

- We have awarded £31,107 to support the purchase of SONOCA 300- a piece of state-of-the-art equipment designed for paediatric neurosurgery. It allows surgeons to locate and remove brain tumours in children with much less disruption to the rest of the brain, making the surgery quicker and easier and drastically lowering the recovery period.

## BRIDGING THE GAP

We fund projects to ensure health equity and support initiatives that address the diverse needs of our communities.

- Looking ahead we are excited to fund the new Equity Lead role at St George's Hospital. They will identify key health inequalities experienced by the local community and lead on projects designed to tackle these.
- The charity is currently funding 'Living With and Beyond Cancer', an outreach project that supports patients during and after their cancer treatment. This includes designing materials to help patients self manage their condition, providing physiotherapy to help patients prepare for treatment, and training over 400 staff and students to support patients living with and beyond cancer.

## IMPROVING THE HOSPITAL EXPERIENCE

Our goal is to ensure everyone who visits our hospitals has the best possible experience. Through our arts programme, engagement activities, and enhancing hospital spaces, we're making every visit more positive and welcoming.

- Our Time for a Change Children's Appeal is on a mission to transform the children's wards at St George's, bringing them up to the standard of the world-class care we deliver. We're focused on enhancing sanitation, creating welcoming recreational spaces, and making the wards brighter and friendly for young patients. We are excited for work to get underway on the first ward in 2025.
- A generous donation from The National Lottery Heritage Fund is enabling our Arts Team to embark on a multi-year programme to conduct audit, restoration and interpretation work on our Art and Heritage Collection, as well as engaging our hospital community and the public through temporary exhibitions and creative heritage activities.
